# Preventing chewing gum litter

Scots love chewing gum. We spend £28.6 million on the stuff every year.

But used gum causes a huge litter problem. Discarded chewing gum never breaks down. It makes our towns and cities look grubby, harms our wildlife and uses up a hefty chunk of our public budgets – on average, each bit of gum costs only **3p to buy, but £1.50 per square metre to clean up.**
